

Registering for the University of Scouting

Class sizes are limited so please register early to ensure your spot in the courses you wish to take. Although we will do our best to accommodate all registrations, due to instructor availability, class limitations and circumstances beyond our control we may find it necessary to reschedule or cancel a class. On-line registration is available only through **CampMaster**, and will run from the end of October through December 16, 2018. After this date, on-line registration will not be available, but you will be able to do walk-in registration for classes that are still available. Additional instructions for the use of **CampMaster** are available starting on page 23 of this Program Overview.

Walk-in registration is the day of the event and is required if you did not pre-register. **All day courses may not be available for walk-in selection.** Walk-ins will receive course assignments based on availability of classroom space, instructors and time. Lunch and the commemorative patch will be available based on the number of pre-registered participants. Due to time constraints, walk-in registrants may be unable to complete registration in time to attend a course scheduled for the first period. In other words, **we strongly encourage you to use on-line registration** to have the best opportunity to get into the classes you wish. Please follow the signs on campus to direct you to the registration location.

Registration does not constitute check-in. You will need to check-in on the day of the event.

Registration Fee

Online registration will be available up to December 16, 2018. This year the cost is \$30 for all who register online. After December 16, 2018 registration will close and only walk-in registration will be available. **Some courses may close during online registration due to classroom limitations.** Which means many of the leader specific courses may not be available for walk-in registrants. Walk-in registration is \$45 regardless of the number of classes taken or if lunch is desired. This per person fee includes attendance to all courses, lunch, commemorative patch, course handouts, facility expenses and covers liability insurance recovery and administrative costs. Please pre-register and save money!

Basic Schedule

The University of Scouting will run from 7:00am until 5:00pm. Walk-in registration will begin at 7:00am and schedule updates will be posted. Each participant will receive a personalized schedule of classes. Classes are 60 minutes in duration with 15 minutes between classes and begin at 8:30am. Each lunch period is 60 minutes. Your schedule will have 7 session periods available. Depending on the courses you select and your decision to take lunch or not will determine how many courses you will be able to take. Before you begin your actual registration in CampMaster, please review the various college offering and determine which courses in which college you wish to take.

If you do not have a CampMaster Account, you will need to get one before you register!! It is free. All you need is an active email address. When you first go to the CampMaster home page, it will walk you through the process of setting up an account.

Once you have your account, you may now register for the University of Scouting. If you need additional assistance, go to page 20 of this document. If you are registering for other individuals, you will need to have their CampMaster account or create one on their behalf.

After you register, you may come back into your Camp Master account and change your course selections up to December 10, 2017. After that, you will **not** be able do online registration or make changes to your schedule. Any modifications will need to occur during the day of the event at the different College's tables after you have checked-in.

Location, Facilities and Parking

The Circle Ten Council University of Scouting will be held at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas. Specifically, our classes will be located near Dallas Hall, or the Simmons buildings on the north side of campus. Other buildings may be used as needed. Detailed maps (see Appendix for the current one), driving directions and diagrams of the campus may be found on the SMU website at the following address: <http://www.smu.edu/maps>.

Handicap Parking will be available upon request. Please notify the Chancellor or Facilities Vice-Chancellor of your need. Special instructions will be sent to you.

An email will be sent to all participants during the week prior to the event providing parking information and other campus activities which might impact our day. If you have any questions, please contact the Chancellor at Jimmy@GreenwoodJr.com. Please be mindful and considerate of the surroundings. Each classroom should be accessible; however, access to elevators may be limited. There should be sufficient time to move between buildings for your class changes. Directions and schedules will be in your check-in packet. Please send an email to the Facilities Director (facilities@c10univ.org) if you have a special medical or accessibility requirement. We have done our best to minimize travel times.

CHECK-IN, Materials Pickup and Walk-in Registration Location

We will have registration once again in the MAC hall above the Cafeteria. All participants and staff will need to check in at this "Check-In and Registration" location. Final instructions will be sent out regarding registration and parking information the week of the event. Participants will need to pick up a materials packet during this check-in process. You may not attend a class without registering. The Registration Hall will have staff on hand throughout the day to assist you with any questions.

Lunch

Due to the number of participants, lunch will be provided from 11:50-1:30. This will give everyone ample time to visit the University of Scouting Midway Tent. Upon check-in you will receive a handout which contains your lunch ticket. Please turn in your lunch ticket at one of the locations within the cafeteria to receive your lunch. Walk-in registrants will receive a lunch ticket when they register.

Classes which run through the lunch period will walk to lunch sometime while the cafeteria is open, during a natural class instruction break, and hopefully when the lunch crowd is minimal.

Although SMU typically provides a variety of foods to meet today's student demands, special dietary needs may not be met; therefore, please bring your own lunch if your diet restrictions are not normally met in cafeteria style restaurants. Due to the size of our event and the logistics involved, we cannot accommodate specialized menus or food orders. Partial refunds are not available if you decide to bring your own meal.

University Midway

Our Midway this year should be our biggest and best ever. Please visit the many vendors who are there to make your life as a Scout leader easier. The location should be easy to find, as it will be in a huge tent on the main mall of the SMU campus. As with everything, please provide us with ideas for vendors for future Universities of Scouting.

Philmont Lottery Drawing

Drawing for Philmont treks will be held at noon (12:00 PM) in the Mac Ballroom, where registration/check-in will be held. All interested Troop, Crew or Ship leaders should attend.

Guests and or Accompanied Children?

Guests are not allowed. All who attend the University of Scouting must register as a participant, instructor or attend as an invited guest of the Chancellor. There are no accommodations for babysitting, day care or other means to look after children. As a courtesy

to other attendees and to prevent any disruptions, children are not permitted to attend the event even if accompanied by a parent or guardian. The only exceptions to this rule are those youth Scouts (14 years of age or older) who have registered for one of the youth-eligible classes: Venturing Academy or Senior Patrol Leader Academy. **SMU is now requiring a parental consent form to be provided for participants under 18. Instructors will be contacting attendees to provide and bring the completed form with them to check-in. Participants under 18 will not be allowed to stay without the parental consent form completed and signed.**

Be sure to review classes in ALL COLLEGES! We have moved several classes from different programs into the College of General Studies in addition to adding new classes in each College.

Suggested Courses by Need or Experience

If you are new to Scouting, we recommend you take the prescribed course to be considered "trained" for your position. For example, if you are a Den leader, we recommend CUB101-Cub Leader Specific Training. These "official" courses are highlighted in green. You will notice that there are not very many of these courses offered at the University of Scouting; this is because those courses are offered at many other places and times, whereas the University of Scouting offers unique courses you won't find anywhere else. Once again, you should look at the position you hold in your unit, and the future position you will hold next year, for guidance on which courses to take. A prime example is the BOY201-Strictly for Scoutmasters and CUB201-Strictly for Cubmasters courses. These are excellent courses for current and future Scoutmasters and Cubmasters. They cover everything from campouts to Scoutmaster Minutes to Blue/Gold Banquets to ADD/ADHD issues. All of these specific topics are also covered by specific courses, like GEN324-Scoutmaster Minutes and GEN313-Essentials of Scouts with Disabilities. This applies to all colleges except for the Commissioner College. The Commissioner College has a pre-set course offering designed by the National office which steers participants to specific "degrees" within that College. Only the Commissioner College offers degree programs as designated by the Boy Scouts of America national office.

Everyone, no matter their position is Scouting, should look at the General Studies College for courses that apply to all areas of Scouting. For example, GEN110-Flag Etiquette is essential to the Cub Scout program, but the Cub Scout College doesn't offer a course that covers that topic; you'll only find that in the General Studies College.

As a reminder, each course is hosted by a University of Scouting college. However, except for the Commissioner College where specific degrees are offered, you do not have to be involved at any specific level to take any specific course. Although we hope all

courses will always be available, it's possible a course or two might become full. Check the schedule closely as some are offered at multiple times.

Course Offerings and Time Grids

The following are the course offerings by College with a brief course description following the grid. Please use this to determine the courses attend. Please note that the name will determine the College, the course number and the session offered (CUB101.1 versus CUB101.2).

Each College is identified by the first three letters:

Always remember the General Studies College as it contains courses which are applicable across most if not all types of Units.

Course Descriptions

- GEN101 State of the BSA/Council:** Come hear Circle Ten's Key 3 report on how the latest BSA changes have effected our units, districts, the council and the BSA. Expect a probable appearance by the Chief Scout Executive Mike Surbaugh.
- GEN102 Chartered Organization Representative:** Learn about the duties, responsibilities and powers of the Chartered Organization Representative - it's not just a signature on the application forms.
- GEN105 Intro into Planning & Unit Finances:** The purpose of this course is twofold; understand the importance of the annual program plan and how to finance your annual events.
- GEN106 Leave No Trace Camping:** A thoughtful frame of mind and understanding of outdoor ethics is essential to maintaining wilderness conservation. Learn the basic principles of Leave No Trace to maintain the outdoor experience for all scouts to come.
- GEN108 Native American Cultural Awareness in Scouting:** Ins & outs and dos & don'ts of the use of Native American culture in your programs. Many programs in Scouting draw on the traditions of various Native American tribes, even the Founders of Boy Scouting used.
- GEN110 Flag Etiquette:** Knowing the U.S. Flag Code will give you confidence when teaching scouts how to handle the flag at meetings, Courts of Honor or any daily or special event.
- GEN111 A Scout is Reverent:** Scouting with Faith is about integrating a faith program throughout Scouting activities, as a core component of character development while bringing deeper meaning to reach Scouts on a new level. Learn about delivering a faith based program, whether your unit is of single faith, or mixed faiths. Discover how to support and promote the Chaplain's Aide leadership position, collect and develop reusable resources, and opportunities for scouts to engage in their respective faith.
- GEN112 Guide to Safe Scouting: Risk Management:** Safety first. Scouting safety begins with leadership. This class will give you an overview of how to keep your scouts safe using the Sandwich Principle.
- GEN113 Community Service:** How can your unit serve its community? There are many ways you've probably never thought about.
- GEN114 Geocaching to Promote Scouting:** Learn how to set up a geocaching course or how to use public courses in your unit. Scout is "a game with a purpose." Geocaching is the game, learn its purpose.
- GEN115 Technology in Scouting:** Mobile devices, social media, augmented reality, etc. - your Scouts understand it, do you?
- GEN116 Guide to Advancement Overview:** This course provides a brief intro the Guide, the mentality of advancement and key issues that create challenges for units or end up as questions sent to National. The 2017 revision will also be previewed, including clarifications and improvements based on volunteer feedback nationwide.
- GEN117 Custom Neckerchief Slides:** A custom neckerchief slide can make your unit stand out and enhance unit pride. Learn the history of slides and hands on ideas for making slides your Scouts will enjoy.
- GEN119 Scoutbook:** Answering the Questions: New to Scoutbook? Have a question about a Scoutbook feature? Need assistance in "syncing" your unit for BSA & Council Advancement? Have a new Scout joining your unit and want to import his/her advancement? Look no farther than this informal open forum program where you can share your questions with experienced Scoutbook leaders and learn about SUAC, the Scoutbook User Advisor Council which provides 24-hour expert response to Scoutbook questions.
- GEN201 Scoutbook Lite:** Scoutbook "Lite" is replacing BSA's legacy Internet Advancement tool and will be the required method of reporting advancement for users who choose to not use the full version of Scoutbook. Join us for an overview of using Scoutbook Lite to report your Scouts advancement!
- GEN203 Campfire Magic:** Bring more life to your campfires with songs, skits and stories to create those magical moments of scouting.
- GEN204 Social Media/PR:** Get the word out - promote your unit and scouting and the same time. Learn how to get events, photos and stories published.
- GEN205 The Spectrum of Autism:** Understand how Scouts on the Spectrum differ from others and how to leverage their enhanced abilities and support them with their challenges. Learn how to speak their language and engage their parents to have a better Scouting experience.
- GEN206 Supporting Scouts with ADHD/Special Needs:** Many Scouts demonstrate hyperactivity, impulsivity, and/or inattention. This training focuses on explaining these characteristics of Attention Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder, helping Scout leaders develop strategies for supporting Scouts with AD/HD, and enabling them to get the most out of the Scouting program.
- GEN208 The NOVA Award:** Understand BSA's new NOVA program. What is it and why was it created. How can you use it to benefit your unit?

- GEN209 Family Camping Chair Training:** This course is designed for the district Family Camping Chair and/or volunteers interested in leading Family Camping events within their district. The session will give an understanding of the BSA National Camping Standards and to help districts bring the very best Family Camping experience to Cub Scouts and their families.
- GEN212 Finding Money to pay for Unit Activities:** Popcorn, car washes, selling candy and wreathes. How do you finance your troop's activities? This session will help you find new ways and the right ways to finance the fun and business of an active unit.
- GEN214 Cooking for Allergies and Special Diets:** Creative ways to cook for special diets, vegetarians, or anyone in Scouting.
- GEN216 Creating Geocaching Courses:** Augment your unit's advancement program with geocaching. We will examine what requirements are easily adaptable and how to choose age appropriate caches.
- GEN219 Teaching Leadership in the Outdoors:** What are the core leadership skills in the outdoors? Then developing these skills in the Scouts outdoors. Learning to stand back and let the Leadership develop in the Outdoors. Using the Outdoors to further your units programs.
- GEN304 Philmont Training Center:** See what's available at the Philmont Training Center for the Scout, Scouter and the whole family. Learn how to make this a family vacation.
- GEN305 Managing District Activities:** The how-to course for creating and managing fun and successful district and council activities. Learn the importance of and how to work themes, finding and managing staff, how to make the budget and registration system work for you, and more. For camp directors, activity chairs, and anyone interested in running a successful event.
- GEN307 Leadership Succession Planning:** Does your unit have an Annual Plan? This class will provide you some tools, insights, and discussions on a very critical aspect of Scouting – leadership succession planning. Let's discuss typical leadership roles, how to identify future leaders, and how to get them to commit. This is a MUST for unit committee chairs, chartered organization representatives, unit leaders, and anyone else interested in the "survival" of their unit.
- GEN308 Leader Burnout:** How to avoid it in yourself and others.
- GEN309 Radio Communication on Outings:** Have you bought a two-way radio on the internet and are not sure if it can be legally operated. Are you looking for more range? This course will cover radio communication basics, license free options, and licensed options. Time will be spent discussing how to obtain a FCC part 90 license for more power.
- GEN310 CPR:** This half day long course will provide the necessary training and requirements to earn your CPR certification. It will require some preliminary work before the course in order to receive your CPR trained certification. Each participant needs to bring an additional \$35 for certification.
- GEN313 Essentials of Scouts with Disabilities:** Learn basic skills and principles for working with out of the ordinary Scouts. Understand the 3 A's of disability awareness; Access, Accommodation, and Adaptation. Learn how the fourth and most important A, Attitude, makes the difference between an ordinary and an extraordinary Scouting experience for all your scouts.
- GEN320 Scoutbook: Myths/Facts/Experiences:** Is your unit considering a move to Scoutbook? If so, this class is for you! Join us as we present an overview to Scoutbook features and operations. Learn how Scoutbook empowers each Scout to take ownership in tracking his/her own advancement through any smart phone! See a demonstration of how Scouts, Parents, and Leaders all see the same "live" information in Scoutbook and how easy it is for Unit Leaders to handle BSA advancement reporting with a single "click" of a mouse!
- GEN322 Beyond The Beads:** So you've completed your Wood badge ticket... maybe years ago. What's next? Join this year's Wood Badge Course Directors as they share ideas of what you can do after your ticket is complete to continue to serve with your heart. How do you join a Wood Badge or NYLT staff? What is the Philmont Leadership Challenge? What changes are coming to Wood Badge in 2019 and what is the significance of Wood Badge on its 100th anniversary.
- GEN323 Backpacking Tips:** What do you really need to bring and what do you not need to bring? Food, a unit travels on its stomach. Where can you go? What unit gear is essential and what not so much? How can you prepare your unit for the trip? How to keep it fun. Transportation concerns and tips. Money, money, money. We will discuss these topics and anything else that comes to mind.
- GEN324 Scoutmaster Minutes:** Scoutmaster minutes – your moment, your message – are you prepared, are you doing your best? The scoutmaster minute for some is dreaded, for some, oh shoot I forgot, some read it out of a book. You can do better, much better. Bring your best and not so best. We will share tips, ideas, where can you get your ideas, critiques to help you shape the message for your scouts. Everyone will get a chance to present. It is your minute, you owe your best for your scouts.
- GEN325 Aquatics:**
- GNE330 Religious Emblems Coordinator Training:** Religious Emblems Coordinator (REC) positions exist at the Council, District

and Unit levels. The REC's are responsible for educating, motivating, evaluating, and expanding the usage of the religious emblems programs. If you are a REC or interested in becoming a REC to encourage and promote the religious emblems programs available in BSA, this course addresses the purpose of RECs and the expectations and responsibilities of REC's.

GEN340 Bullying:

GEN350 District Committee Workshop Primer: This class is specifically designed for first-time District Committee members who have not had District Committee Workshop Training. Course Descriptions

- BOY101 SM/ASM Leader Specific Training:** Required leader-specific training for all adults with SM/ASM positions.

- BOY214 Troop Medical Emergency Preparedness:** We pray it never happens but you have to be prepared for when it does. Here's how.

Course Descriptions

- BCS101** **Core Concepts of Commissioner Service:** An Introductory course to familiarize a new commissioner with the commissioner concept as perceived by the BSA.
- BCS103** **Linking District Resources:** This course explains the relationship between the commissioner staff and the district, linking resources.
- BCS104** **Contacting Units:** This course defines the roles of commissioner service and the importance of contacts with their units

and timely recording of those contacts in Commissioner Tools

- BCS105 Resolving Common Unit Issues:** This course shows how a commissioner should use Commissioner Tools and Early Warning Signals to be alerted to unit issues
- BCS106 Coaching Leaders:** This course will discuss new coaching model and how it applies to Commissioners service.
- BCS107 Journey to Excellence:** Learn about the elements of the Unit Journey to Excellence and what it takes to ensure success in every unit.
- BCS108 Mining Internet Resources:** Learn about “mining” the internet BSA resources that can assist all commissioners to support unit services.
- BCS109 The Essential Element (A Servant’s Heart):** This course will discuss will discuss servant leadership and the role it plays in commissioner service
- BCS112 Recruiting Unit Commissioners:** This course will discuss methods of recruiting unit Commissioners.
- BCS114 Understanding & Communicating with Today’s Leaders:** This course encourages understanding between the different generations to help commissioners better communicate with their units
- BCS116 Collaborative Assessments & Intro to Unit Service Plan:** This course examines and discusses the need for collaboration in assessing unit’s strengths and needs, build a Unit Service Plan and record in Commissioner Tools.
- BCS117 Commissioner & Unit Key 3:** This course examines the roles of the Unit Key 3 and how a commissioners’ works and coaches each.
- BCS150 Roundtables in Commissioner Service:** This course will provide information on the purpose of roundtables to help units succeed by providing useful program ideas, information on policy, and current information on council and district events and training opportunities.
- BCS151 The Roundtable Commissioner Team:** This course will review the duties and responsibilities of the roundtable commissioner team by looking at the individual responsibilities of each member of the roundtable commissioner team.
- BCS152 Year-Round Roundtable Planning/Process/Promotion:** This course will provide information on the roundtable planning process, how to create an annual plan to provide unit service to the district, and how to promote roundtables.
- BCS153 Roundtable & Commissioner Tools:** This course will educate participants on the tools available in Commissioner Tools for the roundtable team to manage unit service effectively.
- BCS154 Cub Scout Roundtables:** This course will provide an understanding of the Cub Scout Roundtable process.
- BCS155 Boy Scout Roundtables:** This course will provide an understanding of the Boy Scout Roundtable process.
- BCS156 Recruiting, Training, and Recognizing the Roundtable Team:** This course will provide an understanding of different methods to recruit, train, and recognize members of the roundtable team.
- CED701 Combatting Commissioner Stress/Burnout:** We’ve all had our moments when we ask ourselves, “Why are we involved in Scouting?” This session is designed to examine indicators of stress, how stress affects those around us, and how we might overcome these negative manifestations.
- CED706 Becoming a Project/Thesis Advisor:** (It is preferred that instructors and advisors have their CCS Doctorate.)
- CED712 Friendstorming:** Recruiting is hard work. The process described in this course will aid in finding good Commissioners.
- CED713 Advancement for Scouts with Special Needs - Commissioner's Role:** Virtually every unit will experience having a youth who has disabilities. This course will provide Commissioners with knowledge to share with unit leaders so they can provide an Advancement program which provides these youth with the Scouting opportunities to succeed. Participants of this course will become familiar with the “Rules of Engagement” for advancement in each of the Scouting program areas to help them to respond to the needs of these special youth.
- CED716 Conflict Resolution for Commissioners:** Conflict arises from differences. It occurs whenever people disagree over their values, motivations, perceptions, ideas, or desires. Sometimes these differences look trivial, but when a conflict triggers strong feelings, a deep personal need is at the core of the problem, a need to feel safe and secure, a need to feel respected and valued.
- CED720 Valuing Diversity: Introduction:** The purpose of this course is to increase knowledge and general understanding of diversity issues without making value judgments or calling into question peoples’ religious, culture, or political beliefs and affiliations.
- DCS501 Selecting Your Project / Thesis Topic:** This session assists doctoral candidates in selecting their project or thesis concept.
- DCS502 Limiting the Scope of Your Project / Thesis Topic :** Developing Your Project / Thesis : Doctoral candidates explore various procedures to reduce their topic to a workable size. A suggested approval process will also be shared.
- DCS504 Project / Thesis Open Workshop Forum:** This Q and A open forum provides doctoral candidates an opportunity to review completed projects and theses instilling confidence that this task is attainable.
- DCS506 Commissioner Coaching and Mentoring:** Coaching and mentoring are complimentary efforts focused on supporting the highest level of service for administrative commissioners. This class will focus on coaching skills for administrative commissioners.
- DCS512 Commissioner Recruiting Workshop :** This session is designed to discuss best practices for recruiting administrative

commissioners.

- DCS514 Building Meaningful Relationships:** Commissioner service is all about relationships. This session suggests ways in which commissioners may go about building and maintaining positive relationships with those they serve. It also discusses possible pitfalls that can undermine relationships .
- DCS516 Succeeding with the Unit Service Plan:** The Unit Service Plan is the roadmap to unit success. With appropriate guidance the commissioner staff can provide significant unit assistance. The district administrative commissioners will need comprehensive data to set the course for unit success across the district.
- MCS303 Managing Unit Service at the District Level (using Commissioner Tools):** Familiarize the student on the modules available in Commissioner Tools so that they can enhance their ability to support the unit
- MCS304 Commissioner Service for Units at Risk :** This course will show how to recognize the signs of a unit in crises and develop the skills to resolve the issues. It will also cover what information to input to commissioner tools.
- MCS305 Resolving Critical Unit Issues:** The course will quickly review information from MCS 304. After this introduction, various role playing scenarios and discussion scenarios will be presented for the class to work through.
- MCS306 Mentoring Skills for Commissioners:** The course will discuss the new mentoring model, differences of coaching and mentoring and how it applies to commissioner service
- MCS307 Commissioner Service for New Units:** The course will explain the role of the new unit commissioner in the establishment of a new unit and his role in providing service to that unit. It will discuss the special needs of a new unit and provide guidance in providing that service. The guidance will be made in accordance with the role as described in the Unit Performance Guide
- MCS309 Good Commissioners Need Both Head and Heart:** Commissioners need a balance between technical knowledge and personal relationship with their units
- MCS311 All About the ADC's Roles:** Educate the audience on the purpose of the assistant district commissioner role and how it benefits commissioner services.
- MCS312 Recruiting a High Performance Team:** To be able understand and implement the 10-step process in recruiting commissioners.
- MCS313 Onboarding New Commissioners:** Review the onboarding process of newly recruited commissioners.
- MCS314 The Commissioner & the Professional:** Commissioners explore the commonalities of their roles and the roles of the professionals in order to foster positive and productive relationships.
- MCS315 Effective Unit Service in Rural Communities:** This course will discuss the unique issues of rural units and how to solve them.
- MCS316 Developing the Unit Service Plan:** This course builds off BCS 116 Collaborative Assessments to identify and develop unit service plans based on the collaborative assessment outcome.
- MCS350 Unit and Roundtable Commissioners Working Together:** This course will provide an opportunity to see how all the members of the commissioner corps in a district help units identify and resolve their problems.
- MCS351 How to Conduct the Annual Planning Session :** This course will provide a hands-on exercise in using resources to create a model roundtable year at both the district or council level.
- MCS352 Roundtable is Over, Now What?:** This course will provide an understanding of the importance of evaluation. Using feedback, the roundtable commissioner team will be able to adjust plans and bring resources to help units solve their problems.
- MCS353 The Cub Scout Breakout:** This course will provide an understanding of the need to have specific Cub Scout interest topics and materials to address the unique problems and challenges that Cub Scout Leaders have implementing their program.
- MCS354 The Boy Scout Breakout:** This course will provide an understanding of the need to have specific Boy Scout interest topics and materials to address the unique problems and challenges that Boy Scout Leaders have implementing their program.
- MCS355 Using the ADC for RT in your District:** This course will provide an introduction of the responsibilities of this position in a district unit service plan.
- MCS357 Managing Long Distance Roundtables:** This course will provide an understanding of the current resources available to enhance long distance roundtables.
- MCS358 RT and Solving Unit Problems:** This course will provide a summary of the overall approach of using roundtables in helping units solve their own problems.


